The beautiful girl is no longer the one we hate, or expect to be mean and stuck-up. No, now she is not only beautiful, but also approachable, someone you can pal around with. She is now nonstop funny. In fact, you can't shut the bitch up, because right now, funny, young women are big in the movies.

OK, so now we know there's a need. There are surely many beautiful young women—don't forget young—who would exert themselves to be funny, especially if it could get them into movies and make them rich and famous. In fact, I'm sure there are tons.

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you have a very limited talent pool.

Do I have any advice for aspiring beautiful comedy actresses desirous of taking advantage of this momentary hole in the Hollywood acting pool? Sorry, no, but I will note that when I've looked at the résumés of those lovely young women who made me laugh, a number of them had theater experience.

Nothing teaches you how to get a laugh like a live audience. You learn quickly, because nothing's worse than a funny moment that doesn't get a response. You know it immediately with a live audience. It's called silence. Dead silence. Scariest than the scariest thing you've seen in any horror movie, especially if you're the person up there on the stage, or the guy who wrote the screenplay that just left an audience cold, or the director responsible. On the other hand, making people laugh is pure joy. There's no satisfaction quite like it. You're bringing pleasure to people. You're entertaining them. You can hear it. There's no stronger affirmation that something you did works.

Over the years, the demand for comedians, male and female, has surged and retreated, but it has never gone away. We all want to laugh, even while we're crying. Improv theater is suddenly hot again, comedy clubs not so much. Rom-coms, sitcoms and now female ensemble comedy don't require standup as much as acting orientation. Comedy for the moment is playing with other actors, in scenes, dialogue mixed with physical comedy.

Beautiful girls have always been the staple of Hollywood. It's just that at the moment, there's a demand for funny and beautiful. It's a grand old tradition, too. Look up Mabel Normand, Marion Davies, Carol Lombard, or think of Lucille Ball, Marilyn Monroe, right on up to now, with Kristen Wiig, Sarah Silverman and on and on. Or rather not so on and on, because you'll quickly run out of names in today's generation.

Too bad, too, 'cause beauty and laughs can go together. It's a special gift, an unusual combination. If you've got 'em, there's a need here in Hollywood.
